

Brevard C.A.R.E.S. Board Report February 2015

Strengthening Families...Whatever It Takes!

January 2015

During the month of December 2014, the Executive Director initiated an inactive cases project to close out any cases that were 180 plus days old in the Prevention Program. 141 cases were identified which met this criteria. 10 day closure letters were mailed out to these clients. Staff were provided weekly deadlines and were instructed to begin working on Discharge Summaries for these cases. To allow the Prevention staff time to close out these inactive cases, the Diversion Program is currently taking all level 3 cases. As of January 27, 2015, the Prevention team has closed 100 cases with 238 children on those cases.

The Executive Director began working on the 5 Year Plan for the prevention of abuse, abandonment, and neglect of children with the Leadership Planning Team. The group met each Tuesday morning throughout January to decide on 3 main priorities the circuit would like to include in the plan and then identify strategies to address those priorities. The priorities are an increase in interagency collaboration, public awareness campaign related to child abuse and fatality prevention, and support protective and promotive factors resulting in trauma informed system of care. The plan will be submitted to DCF by Friday, February 13, 2015 in order to allow DCF to combine Brevard County and Seminole County's data together.

The Executive Director was asked to serve on the National Center For Innovation and Excellence Board of Directors while they are in transition. The Board Orientation was held on Tuesday, January 21, 2015 and the initial Board Meeting will be held on Friday, January 30, 2015. As more information is learned about this, the Executive Director will provide an update to the Brevard C.A.R.E.S. Board.

On January 27, 2015, Executive Assistant, Osha Goodwin and Family Partner, Shantinese Jackson, implemented the Cribs For Kids training at Cocoa High School to teach teen parents about the dangers of co-sleeping. Osha and Shan will implement the training at all high schools in Brevard county with teen parent programs.
